"Why all the caution tape on books at the library?" you ask. Currently in the ND State
Legislature are two bills, HB 1205 and SB 2360, that librarians and many others feel are procensorship and a violation of First Amendment rights as provided by the US Constitution.
HB 1205 states that "a public library may not maintain in its children's collection inventory
books that contain explicit sexual material." SB 2360 has far reaching consequences by making
any person who willfully displays any sexually explicit material in business establishments
frequented by minors guilty of a class B misdemeanor. This includes public and public school
libraries. Proponents of these bills say they are not about book banning, they merely stop those
willfully exposing minors to obscenity to stop the action. (The Hazen Star, April 6, 2023,
Legislative Letter from Sen. Keith Boehm) Rep. Bill Tveit states that "neither of these bills are
or were about book banning. They both simply require a good, healthy management process
for all libraries". (The Hazen Star, April 6, 2023, Legislative Letter from Rep. Bill Tveit). The
caution tape is on material that other people have deemed inappropriate to be in the library.
You may recognize some as books you read in an English class when you were in Jr. High
or High School. Was it sexually explicit or inappropriate?

Libraries are here to provide books and other material for entertainment and information on all sides of a subject - be it pro or con. Libraries have collection development policies for the "healthy management" of material we bring into libraries. You, the public library user, give us input on what material you would like your public library to purchase. If you feel something in your public library is inappropriate, there is a reconsideration process where the material is reviewed and may be relocated or removed from the library after the process has been completed. You have the right to decide what you or your children or grandchildren may read, the same as deciding what they may watch on tv or what video games they may play. Censorship and book banning takes away the ability to make that decision because the material is not available.

To keep up-to-date on these and other bills in the ND State Legislature, you can go to the website: ndlegis.gov Type in the bill number and read the bill for yourself. If you are so moved to contact our local legislators, their information can be found on the website or in any of the local newspapers. We, of course, have that information at the library.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY

Detroit Lakes, MN - Three North Country Trail Association Chapters in North Dakota to host a virtual event on April 23rd to share more about volunteer opportunities on the North Country National Scenic Trail

All area hiking & trails enthusiasts are invited to attend a virtual program being offered on Sunday, April 23rd at 7pm CT by the North Country Trail Association (NCTA) and its three North Dakota Chapters. The program will cover what is the North Country National Scenic Trail (NCT), its history and management, and where is it routed across North Dakota. That introduction will be followed by information about how Chapter volunteers build & maintain the NCT in North Dakota, what resources exist to help volunteers do their work safely, and what volunteer opportunities there currently are along the NCT in North Dakota. We will close the program with time for attendees to ask questions they may have about volunteering on the Trail and breakout sessions with each Chapter to talk specifically about local opportunities.

Administered by the National Park Service, the North Country National Scenic Trail stretches 4,800-miles from Lake Sakakawea State Park near Pick City, ND to the Appalachian Trail in Vermont. Approximately 475 of the NCT's 4,800 miles stretch across North Dakota from Lake Sakakawea State Park to Fort Abercrombie State Historic Site. North Dakota's NCT segment is different than further east given the State's abundant prairie and "big sky" landscape. Jan Ulferts-Stewart, a North Country Trail Association Board member and volunteer trail adopter from Fargo, said "Volunteers are the lifeblood of the NCT, one of only eleven National Scenic Trails designated by Congress and the only one found in North Dakota. There is opportunity for more North Dakotans to help steward this amazing Trail. This virtual program will be a good way for potential new volunteers to make a connection with the NCT."

The NCT is built, maintained, promoted, and protected by volunteers who dedicate their time and talents to this nationally significant Trail. "There are opportunities for people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities to make a meaningful contribution to completing the NCT in North Dakota" said Mark Zimmerman of the Central Flyway Chapter, which is based in Riverdale, ND. The North Country Trail Association is a volunteer-based non-profit organization whose mission is to build, maintain, promote, and protect the North Country National Scenic Trail (NCT). The three NCTA Chapters in North Dakota are the Central Flyway Chapter, Sheyenne River Valley Chapter, and Dakota Prairie Chapter. They host regular guided hikes, trail building and maintenance workdays, and fun events year round. 

Paddlefish Tags Online

North Dakotas paddlefish snagging season opens May 1, and snaggers should note the sale and distribution of paddlefish tags are similar to last year. Paddlefish tags are available for purchase online at the North Dakota Game and Fish Departments website, gf.nd.gov, at license vendors, and during normal business hours at Game and Fish Department offices in Bismarck, Dickinson, Jamestown, Devils Lake, Lonetree (Harvey) and Williston. Snaggers buying tags online or at a vendor should plan accordingly and allow for a few days delivery as tags are distributed through the mail.

Deer Gratis Application Online

Landowners interested in a 2023 deer gratis license must apply online by visiting the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov. The deadline for applying is June 7. General deerandmuzzleloaderlottery applications will be available online in early May, also with a deadline of June 7. Gratis applicants who have previously applied online will automatically have their land description forwarded to this years application. However, any changes with land descriptions from last years application must be made prior to submitting the 2023 application.

Whooping Crane Migration

Whooping cranes are in the midst of their spring migration and sightings will increase as they make their way through North Dakota over the next several weeks. Anyone seeing these endangered birds as they move through the state should report sightings so the birds can be tracked. The whooping cranes that do travel through North Dakota are part of a population of about 500 birds on their way from wintering grounds in Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas to nesting grounds at Wood Buffalo National Park in Canada, a distance of about 2,500 miles. Whoopers stand about 5 feet tall and have a wingspan of about 7 feet from tip to tip. They are bright white with black wing tips, which are visible only when the wings are outspread. In flight, they extend their long necks forward, while their long, slender legs extend out behind the tail. Whooping cranes typically migrate singly, or in groups of 2-3 birds, and may be associated with sandhill cranes.

Other white birds such as snow geese, swans and egrets are often mistaken for whooping cranes. The most common misidentification is pelicans, because their wingspan is similar and they tuck their pouch in flight, leaving a silhouette similar to a crane when viewed from below. Anyone sighting whoopers should not disturb them, but record the date, time, location and the birds' activity. Observers should also look for and report colored bands, which may occur on one or both legs. Whooping cranes have been marked with colored leg bands to help determine their identity.

Whooping crane sightings should be reported to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service offices at Lostwood, 701-848-2466; Audubon, 701-442-5474; the North Dakota Game and Fish Department in Bismarck, 701-328-6300; or to local game wardens across the state. Reports help biologists locate important whooping crane habitat areas, monitor marked birds, determine survival and population numbers, and identify times and migration routes.




