### Mannhaven Realty created Pick City

nal members of the Mannhaven Realty Company, and the 16 mem-

bers signed up on June 12, 1946.
"I was the youngest one," Huber says. "And I'm the only one left."

other kinfolk pooled their efforts and cash to turn land along the Missouri Breaks into a town. The group was mostly farmers, but also included an attorney and a service station owner.

Sr. and Jr., Theo. H. Huber, Fred P. Isaak, Eldor Bohrer, Helmuth H. Bohrer, Jacob Mohl, Fabian Guenthner, David Isaak, Peter Bohl, Hubert Stolting, Herbert F. Mohl and L. A. Sailer gathered together, their plan was to create a town in Mercer County so the workers had a place to live while building the Garrison Dam. Their meeting on June 12, 1946,

finalized plans to buy the Peter Mohl farm, and additional land from the State School Lands office.

They called their family corpo-ration the Mannhaven Realty Company, after a small town just a mile or so to the southeast, along the river. Ted Huber was born there. where his father was a blacksmith, and they thought the name appro-

priate for the venture.

On November 11 that year, they met to plat the townsite, and hired Chas. W. Konthask to survey and lay out the new community.

They chose the name 'Pick City' because the name of the Corps of Engineers plan was the Pick-Sloan project, after COE General Lewis A. Pick. The Corps began the ef-fort to harness the Missouri River in Montana, the Dakotas and Nebraska.

When Montana-Dakota Utilities wouldn't supply electricity for the new town, the group bought their

own light plant.

In June of 1947 they met and set prices for lots in the city at \$400-500 for business lots and \$100-150 for residential ones.

By August that year, they bought a well-drilling mahine, and fluber says "drilled llon' t know how many wells, but none of the water was good to drink." In June of 1948 they bought

another light plant to handle in-creasing needs, but when Oliver-Mercer hegan supplying electric-ity they sold both generators. The structure now known as the

Dam Bar was the first building in

Pick City.

Another requirement of the Mannhaven Realty Company was that each shareholder had to buy a lot in town, to build a house of establish a business place in Pick

Huber reminisces about some of the other changes over the years, and says that N.D. Highway 200 was originally about one block south of the present Main Street. The North Dakota Highway De-partment then decided to go back to the old route, and they then had the city replatted in the map con-

It took a group with vision and foresight to establish this small town, and the result of their labors and investments is a town that still exists as a home for several fami-lies.. Most all of the other 'construction' settlements that sprang up during the entire Pick-Sloan project vanished almost as soon as the builders left. Towns like Riverdale, established for the gov-ernment employees, have faded considerably, and are nearly ghost towns, or also have disappeared.

The government gave away a large percentage of the housing in Riverdale, often to school districts or other public entities across North Dakota. On the west side of the dam

however, the town of Pick City re-mains as a testament to the private enterprise that created it.

Pick City lives on, and folks who spent significant parts of their fives here will gather on July 10, 11 and 12 to look things over, and remember the events of a boom-town that didn't go busted when the



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
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### Small Game, Waterfowl, Furbearer Regulations Set

North Dakota's 2023 small game, waterfowl and furbearer regulations are set, and most season structures are similar to last year.

#### Noteworthy items include:

Opening day for ducks, geese, coots and mergansers for North Dakota residents is Sept. 23.

Nonresidents may begin hunting waterfowl in North Dakota Sept. 30.

The prairie chicken and sage grouse seasons remain closed due to low populations.

Pre-charged pneumatic air guns are legal for taking tree squirrels.

Hunters and trappers can find the North Dakota 2023-24 Hunting and Trapping Guide, which includes upland game, migratory game bird and furbearer/trapping regulations and other information, on the Game and Fish website. Printed guides will be available at vendor locations in mid-August.

For a complete listing of opening and closing dates, and daily and possession limits, refer to the table on pages 4-5 of the guide.

#### **Early Canada Goose Dates Announced**

North Dakota's early Canada goose season dates are set, with bag limits and licensing requirements the same as last year.

Opening day is Aug. 15 in all three zones. Closing dates are Sept. 7 in the Missouri River zone; Sept. 15 in the western zone; and Sept. 22 in the eastern zone. Early Canada goose limits are 15 daily and 45 in possession. Limits and shooting hours are different from the regular season, while the zone boundaries remain the same. Shooting hours for early Canada goose are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Residents need a \$5 early Canada goose license and a general game and habitat license. Also, residents 16 and older need a small game license. Nonresidents need only a \$50 early Canada goose license, and the license is valid statewide without counting against the 14-day regular season license. Licenses can be purchased online by visiting the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov.

Harvest Information Program certification is required and beginning Sept. 1 a federal duck stamp for hunters 16 and older is needed. Those who HIP registered to hunt the spring light goose conservation order in North Dakota do not have to register with HIP again, as it is required in each state only once per year. Waterfowl rest areas, closed to hunting during the regular season, are open during the early season. Most land in these rest areas is private, so hunters may need permission to access them. Hunting of Canada geese in August and early September is intended to reduce local Canada goose numbers, which remain high. Game and Fish is attempting to provide additional hunting opportunities to increase pressure on locally breeding Canada geese.

## The Best Dam Town Anywhere July 9,1998

Pick City Plans to celebrate half a century this week-end
Pick City - the town that calls itself "The Best Dam Town Anywhere" is
turning 50 and an anniversary party is scheduled this weekend. Lake Sakakawea in its
back yard and the Missouri River in its front, picturesque
Pick City has a lot to celebrate

While most North Dakota cities are past or nearing the centennial mark, Pick City is just a youthful half-century. It was founded during the construction of Garrison Dam and became a boom town of hastily built shacks for construction workers and a hodge-podge of bars and cafes. It was named for Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of the US Corp of Engineers and co-author of the Pick-Sloan plan. Garrison Dam, at one times the largest earth-rolled dam in the world, was built in response to massive Missouri River flooding in 1942 and 1943. Pick's plan offered the dual advantages of hydro-electric power and flood control. Today, Pick City has settled down some, thought many residents remember its rough and tumble beginning. Pick City's population is a mix of retirees and younger people, drawn there for the town's access to some of the best lake and river fishing in North America. Lake Sakakawea State Park, a 300-acre sprawl of camping and park facilities is within walking distance of Pick City. The park will host its annual Christmas in July festival in conjunction with Pick City's anniversary celebration. Admission to the park will be waived on Saturday Here is a schedule of Pick City's anniversary celebration and events planned for the park's festival. All time are central.

Friday Parade at 7:00 followed by a jam session and Rocky Mountain oysters feed at 9:00 pm at Pick City Hall

Saturday - a road race and walk, including a five-kilometer course for adults and a one kilometer course for children, will leave from the park's south shelter at 9:00 am . An arts and crafts show and a display of recreational vehicles and boats will be set up from 10 am to 10 pm under the events shelter near the marina.

Anyone interested in flea markets can head into Pick City at 10 am and take in a petting zoo. near Scott's Conoco at the same time.

Pick City firemen will host a pork barbeque at 11 am at the city hall. A mountain bike ride begins at the park at the same time. Bike entrants should check the concession store for the start location.

Sailboarders are invited to an 11 am seminar and anyone participating in Sunday's sailboard regatta should meet at the seminar location near the marina.

Pick City will host kids' games at the city park starting at 1:30 pm
A street dance featuring Hard Ride will be held from 1 pm-9pm in front of city hall.
The Christmas in July parade of lighted and decorated boats will depart the marina at dark Boats of all shapes and sizes will sport Christmas lights, tinsel and even Christmas trees in celebration of Christmas in July.

- 1947- New Settler's Day- Whisker Club (fines for shaving)
- 3-2-1947 Pick City Bum- article
- 9-6-48- Motion by J.J. Bohrer, that something be done in regards to the children in the pool hall, and the talk.
- 7-22-51- Village Marshall holding office was injured in the line of duty, however he was intoxicated at the time.
- 4-2-51 Resident of Village took the floor stating street lights, wells & a post office for the town are "wishful thinking" He also stated the town wasted money for police protection as the cop was either in the bars all the time or never at all.
- In 1952 Village Marshall requested a resignation as Marshall for the reason of gossip by the residents of Pick City, to the effect that his character was of ill repute. Resignation was not granted.
- 10-14-57 9:00 curfew for children
- 5-5-62 letter to Pick City resident: Mr.
   Fisher: Dear Sir: "Here is to let you know we have been getting complaints about your cow. She has been in some of the people's gardens, and they don't like it. So please tie her up & keep her home!"
- \* 3-12-81 petition was presented by "concerned citizen" of Pick City regarding strippers at the Dam Bar (formerly 7-11 Club). This caused a lot of controversy in town. The mayor at this time felt there should be some form of control of the matter, but had no objection to it personally. The owner of the bar stated the entertainment was not go-go girls or strippers, they are exotic dancers. The town even had TV coverage on this matter. An Entertainment Ordinance was enacted shortly thereafter.

## A history of Pick City

1948-1998

The building of Pick City is the result of millions of dollars in flood damage along the Missouri River. In 1942 and 1943, the Missouri River flooded tens of thousands of acres from Bismarck to St. Louis. prompting two federal agencies, the Bureau of Reclamation and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, to establish a flood control plan for the river.

The proposal would generate hydro-electric power and at the same time, irrigate land in the Missouri River Basih.

The two plans merged into what is known as the Pick-Sloan Missouri Basin Plan. The plan called for the construction of a 12,000-foot long, 210-foot high, earthen dam, Garrison Dam, that would hold back 23 mil-lion acre feet of water to form Lake Sakakawea.

The Flood Control Act of 1949 appropriated money for the plan.

Pick City was one of the few Garrison Dam boom towns to be considered on the west side of the Missouri

In July of 1946, the town site of Pick City was platted. It was founded in 1947 in the W 1/2 of Sec. 36-147-,

85, one mile west of the dam site.
It was named for Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of the Army Corps of Engineers, and co-author of the Pick-

It was organized as a village in 1948. An excerpt for the January, 29, 1948 Hazen Star reads:

Thirty-eight Pick City Voters turned out Tuesday to show a 34-4 preference for organization of a

village form of government.

The entire 101 acres comprising Pick City was incorporated under the election. The actual village

The entire 101 acres comprising Pick City was incorporated under the election. The actual village government of the new dam-site town will be formed after a regular village election in March. Estimated population of Pick City now exceeds 200, and includes a number of people employed on various phases of dam and bridge construction, as well as people engaged in business. The newest village in Mercer County boasts a grocery store, hardware store, two cafes, a bar, service station, garage, power plant, pool hall, and a hotel, besides a number of residential dwellings and apartment buildings.

Pick City brings the total of incorporated villages and cities in Mercer County to six.

The dam project brought a huge number of people from all over the country. Besides the construction workers, the thousands of people who came every year to watch the dam being built brought prosperity to the

People who settled in Pick City are mainly of German-Russian heritage. After the dam was completed in 1955, many of the construction workers left, but a few workers stayed to make Pick City their permanent

Today, many retired people and persons working in energy-related fields reside in Pick City. Tourism, in the way of fishing and hunting activities, continues to draw people from all over the county to Pick City each

Pick City is the self-proclaimed 'Salmon Capitol of North Dakota.'

In 1981, a new city hall and fire hall were constructed.

Today, the town supports a grocery store, two steak houses and lounges, a convenience store-bait and tackle shop, cafe, laundromat, gift shop, ice cream shop, car wash and a motel.
